The following incident occurred during worship as my friend was ordained as a Minister of Word and Sacrament.

The preacher asked all those who were ordained to stand. Ministers, elders and deacons stood. The preacher then asked all who were ministers to stand. Only the ordained clergy stood the second time. When they were seated again, the preacher asked why everyone did not stand the second time as every Christian is a minister. The preacher’s point was a vivid reminder of the “priesthood of all believers”, the belief that every Christian is given a gift to be used in service to God. In other words, each Christian has a gift to use in his or her “ministry.”

Every year the Church celebrates Pentecost when the church received the gift of the Holy Spirit. Our annual celebrations of Pentecost remind us believers continue to receive the gift of the Holy Spirit at baptism. At our baptisms, each of us are given the gift of the Holy Spirit and called to ministry so the Spirit can work through us to achieve God’s purposes.

How tempting it is for both members and pastors to think that ministry as vocation is the most important call. Certainly, pastors receive special recognition and honor as Ministers of Word and Sacrament. Members may be tempted to deny their own calls and responsibilities and let the “paid professional” carry out ministry on their behalf. But where would the church be without committed men and women, youth and children using their gifts in service to God? Where would the church be without pastors? Where would either group be without the other?

The truth is we all are ministers. Each of us has a gift to contribute to the church whether it is to sing, pray, teach, usher, greet, provide hospitality, visit the sick, serve on a team or board or prepare mailings. Each of us has a gift to use through one’s vocation whether the vocation is one of healing, teaching, serving others, engineering, business, development or building. Gifts used within and outside the church contribute to God’s purpose of loving the world through Christians. Pastoral ministry is only one calling of the Holy Spirit. All who answer Christ’s call to service are ministers. In what ways are you called to minister in Christ’s name?

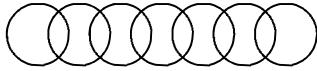

HABITAT FOR HUMANITY - 2010 Presbyterians and Catholics Building Together Spring is in the Air - Time to Build Another House

First of all, many thanks to all Fairmont volunteers for their stewardship of time and financial support building Habitat for Humanity homes during the past 17 years.

This will be the 18th year Fairmont has combined with other churches in the Dayton area to construct a home for De’Andra Kitt and her daughter Raniya. The new house will be at 4745 Stratsburg Dr. near the VA Hospital off of Liscum Dr. in West Dayton. It will be a three-bedroom ranch.

Habitat for Humanity’s (HH) home ownership program is based on the following core policies: (1) HH is a non-denominational ministry; (2) HH is a Partnership-Not a Charity and provides a “hand-up-not a handout”; (3) HH homes are sold under the terms of no-profit construction

and no-interest mortgages; (4) selection of homeowners uses standards that do not discriminate on the basis of religion, race or ethnic background; and (5) HH believes in the principle of families helping to build their homes and the homes of others, and currently requires 300 sweat equity hours for a single-adult family and 500 sweat hours for a two-adult family.

In Dayton it costs more than \$60,000 to build one house - \$25,000 from Presbyterians, \$30,000 from Catholics and \$10,000 "in-kind" services provided by businesses.

We need folks to work in all phases of this project – layout, construction and hospitality tent. We start framing the house "Blitz Week" building every day starting on Saturday, May 29 of Memorial Day Weekend through Friday, June 4, then followed by working Tuesday through Saturday from 8:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m. until the house is completed. There will be a crew on Wednesday evenings for those that are not available during the day.

Sign-ups this year is all done via the website at: <http://daytonhabitat.volunteerhub.com/Events/Browse.aspx>. Go to Event Groups ---> Catch the Building Spirit.

Volunteers can offer anything from a half-day to a day to several days. Any time is appreciated. We would like to remind our volunteers that they only have to work jobs they are comfortable doing; no one is asked to do anything that they would rather not do.

In addition to volunteering your time, or for those who cannot work, you have an opportunity to buy a piece of the house – door knob, window, roofing square, 2x4s, etc. Simply make out your donation check to the church and annotate the note line with Habitat.

The following is a list of Local Missions supported by Fairmont Church:

Good Works

A 501(c)3 non-profit serving Appalachian Ohio through 10 different ministries including providing shelter as well as meals. Also an innovative program called Transformation Station that requires clients to volunteer to earn points for redemption of food and items.

Gospel Mission

Downtown Dayton ministry serving the needs of area residents, providing meals and enhancing faith.

The Castle

Services provided to persons with mental illness. Services include outreach, social events and meals. There are in excess of 200 active members served by the corporation.

House of Bread

A 501(c)3 non-profit Community Kitchen established in 1983, serving predominately the inner-city residents of Dayton, Ohio. Serves a free and nutritious lunchtime meal six days a week, Monday thru Saturday, from 11:30 a.m.-1:00 p.m. Serves as the central meal preparation and distribution site for four community centers that provide after school study programs. Serves as a bridge to beneficial community resources, linking our guests with agencies that provide proven solutions to long-term problems. Serves as one of the community's primary resources for proven solutions in meal distribution and hunger awareness.

Jeremiah's Letter

This program allows the church to "adopt" families at Christmastime, providing gifts and food to needy families. Gifts are collected from a wish list provided by the families and include clothes as well as toys. A Christmas dinner is provided for the families and the food and gifts are delivered on Christmas Eve.

Kettering Schools

Supporting Kettering students through programs like the "Mitten Tree" which collects gloves and hats, collecting school supplies and the "Backpack Program" which helps supply students with healthy snacks such as peanut butter and crackers.

Daybreak

Provides emergency shelter for runaway children ages 10-21. Serves over 1,000 people in crisis per year. In an average year Daybreak provides the following: 25,000 bed nights of shelter and housing; 15,000 bus tokens to transport youth to school and work; 12,000 meals and snacks; 3,200 hours of life skills training in budgeting, grocery shopping, housekeeping, employment skills, anger management, and parenting; 800 hours in drug, alcohol, and tobacco prevention; 700 hours of counseling and advice for their young clients and families; loving and caring staff, volunteers, and donors.

Southminster Food Pantry (FISH)

For more than three decades, The Food Bank has served as the link for food relief in the Miami Valley. The Food Bank– the only one of its kind in the area – nourishes the hunger relief efforts of the community through the acquisition and distribution of food to the

hungry throughout Montgomery, Greene and Preble counties. The Food bBank provides the infrastructure for nearly 100 member programs that serve as the charitable food relief network in the area.

The Food Bank strives to provide healthy, nutritious meals to all individuals we serve. Although The Food Bank's mission is simple, making it happen is a great undertaking that grows larger every day.

Habitat for Humanity

Dayton Ohio Habitat for Humanity works in partnership with God and people from all walks of life to develop communities with people in need by building and renovating houses so that there are decent and affordable homes in safe communities where families can live and grow.

Holt Street Miracle Center

Provides emergency housing for men and women in need.

Kirkmont Camp

Advocates, staff, and Friends of Kirkmont Center share 3 basic values and beliefs that give our shared ministry purpose and focus. These are:
All God's children need to be given opportunity to rest and renew in a safe, peaceful environment.
We are all called to be good stewards of God's creation and to share ideas, information, and resources with others.
We are all called to be part of a transforming community of faith, rooted in the grace of God through Jesus Christ by the power of the Holy Spirit.

Mercy Manner

Provides transitional housing for up to 52 recently released females. Mercy Manor is transitional housing for homeless women who seek to reshape their lives. Not only is Mercy Manor a safe, comfortable residence, it is also a spiritually based program that guides women through the process of becoming responsible.

Mercy Manor Program helps women:

- Redirect priorities
- Establish personal discipline
- Experience God
- Obtain employment
- Manage physical and emotional health
- Develop a drug/alcohol free lifestyle
- Establish goals
- Develop budgets
- Reconnect with families
- Expand Cultural/Community Awareness
